Once you have navigated through the Discernment Absolutes, the 5-Steps of Preparation, and ensured you haven't experienced a Mode One ~ Lightning Bolt Moment (which are quite rare, so don't worry), this worksheet will guide you through the remaining steps of the discernment process.

Ignatian 2ND Mode ~ AN ATTRACTION OF THE HEART Slow Dance Steps God slowly unveils His Will over time. **1. Visualize the Two Options** ~ Do you experience consolation or desolation when visualizing each one? Example: Taking a new job or staying at current job. 2. Take Little Steps ~ Do you experience consolation or desolation when you take little steps towards each of these options? *Example:* Looking at ways to reorganize my current office or freshening up my resume. **3. Discuss with Trusted Friend** ~ Did you experience consolation or desolation during or after the conversation? Huddle Up Points

Ignatian 3rd Mode ~ A PREPONDERANCE OF REASON

No lighting or dancing, just a rough plan of action.

1. Sit, Detach, & Petition ~ We chose a time and place and ourselves and our choices before God with a clear mind. We seek the Lord's Will without predetermined direction.

2. Pro/Cons ~ We write down the advantages and disadvantages of the options, being radically honest. Example: Pros ~ Extra income, freedom from my current boss. Cons ~ I will need to adapt to a new job, and there may be colleagues at the new workplace that I don't get along with.

3. Choice & Confirmation ~ Recognize which alternative brings greater glory to God and ask God to illuminate the choice He desires.

Ignatian 3rd Mode ~ A PREPONDERANCE OF REASON CONT.

1. View from Another Perspective ~ Which option would I suggest to a person who faces the same choice?

Huddle Up Rules

2. Deathbed Wisdom ~ When I am dying, which choice would I wish I would have made?

3. In the Light of Eternity ~ What choice will I wish I would have made to love God fully?

Holy Ground

We write down the decision. We use it as an anchor— a place of refuge and consolation we return to when we face trials and doubts. We go forth in confidence to fulfill God's Will.

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
